June 20-26, 2011 This Planet as Paradise

"Beauty and grace are performed whether or not we... sense them. The least we can do is try to be there." (Annie Dillard). In the churches' first millennium, beauty in creation was doubly focused: (1) understanding God's vivid presence in nature and the human world, and (2) learning to use the Spirit's power to help life flourish in peace.

We will explore the theology of this planet as paradise and create rituals and spiritual practices to cultivate love of beauty and a right relationship with creation. This will include a study of paradise texts, incuding the New Jerusalem Bible's version of Rev. 21 -22; Native American cosmologies of beauty, with a day at a Pueblo Feast Day; attention to the land and deep human ties to landscapes; the ethics and aesthetics of redemption/restoration, and worship as the matrix for perceiving and proclaiming the beauty of restored creation.



The week will include exploration of Ghost Ranch, and field trips to Ohkay Owingeh Pueblo and the Monastery of Christ in the Desert to learn their understanding of and practice of beauty and the spirit. The anchor book of the week will be "Saving Paradise," by Rita Nakashima Brock and Rebecca Parker, a Publisher's Weekly selection for best books of 2008.

Rita Naskashima Brock, Oakland, CA

Rita is founding co-director of Faith Voices for the Common Good, a widely sought lecturer and prize-winning author. With Rebecca Parker, she is co-author of "Saving Paradise: How Christianity Traded Love of This World for Crucifixion and Empire," a Publisher's Weekly selection for best books of 2008.

Marty Haugen, Eagan, MN

Marty is the well-known composer of over 400 liturgical compositions. For 25 years, he has led workshops and consultations on liturgical ministry and given presentations and concerts across the U.S. and abroad.

Janet Parker, Arlington, VA

Janet is Pastor for Parish Life at Rock Spring Congregational United Church of Christ in Arlington, Va. Her work in Christian Ethics includes Indigenous worldviews and struggles for sustainability, sovereignty and land. Currently she provides leadership for people of faith fighting mountaintop removal mining and climate change.

Larry Rasmussen, Santa Fe, NM

Larry is Reinhold Niebuhr Professor Emeritus, Union Theological Seminary. He is the creator and organizer of Ghost Ranch's decade project on Earth-honoring Faith and author of the award-winning volume "Earth Community, Earth Ethics."

Barbara Rossing, Chicago, IL

Barbara is professor of New Testament at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, where she also directs the environmental ministry emphasis. A widely sought lecturer, her current work focuses on the book of Revelation. She is the author of "The Rapture Exposed."

Daniel Spencer, Missoula, MT

Dan is associate professor of Environmental Studies at the University of Montana. He integrates his natural sciences background with religion, ecology and environmental ethics. He is currently wiriting a book, "Ecological Location: Reintegrating the Social and Ecological into an Ethics of Place."
